### WORSHIP AND ACTIVITIES FOR YOUNG PEOPLE

We welcome children in our worship, and we recognize and value the fact that children are wonderfully spontaneous. If you wish, you may make use of the soft space in the West Transept, with an open carpeted area and baskets of soft toys and books (the West Transept is near the front, to the left if you are facing the altar). There is also a more private room, known as the Bride's Room, off of the East Transept, where you may go if you need that type of facility. There is also nursery care available at no charge from 8:30am until 12:30pm in the Children's Center.

On second Sundays at 9:15am, we have a special "Comfy Space" service for those who tend to wiggle during worship and those who worship with them, held in the Children's Chapel. During the school year, Church School and Youth Groups meet at 10:15am.

### COMMUNION

All are welcome to come forward at the time of Communion. The standard practice in the Episcopal Church is that those who are Baptized are welcome to receive Holy Communion. If you are visiting today and are not Baptized but are feeling drawn to receive Communion, we hope that you will come forward and receive, and that afterwards you will talk to one of the clergy about Baptism and what it means both to take Bread and to become part of the Body.

If you don't want to receive communion or are unsure, you are more than welcome to come forward for a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest.

If you have a food sensitivity that requires a **low-gluten Communion Wafer**, simply mention that to the clergy person administering Communion. The receptacle containing the low-gluten Hosts will be brought to you, and you may help yourself to a Host (to avoid cross-contamination). You may either drink from the common Chalice or hold it for the Chalice Minister to intinct for you and place on your tongue. For those who have difficulty approaching the Communion rail, you have the option of **receiving Communion in your seat**. Simply notify an usher, or ask a parishioner seated near you to notify an usher for you.

### RESTROOMS

Restrooms are located in the hallway north of the Murphey Gallery, across the Fishpond Garden and up the walkway from the Church. There is a diaper changing table in the gender-neutral ADA-compliant restroom there. Changing tables are also found in both the men's and women's restrooms in the Music Center.

### ACCESSIBILITY

This facility is **fully accessible**. Please speak to an usher if you need assistance. The main area of the Church, forward of the choir stalls, is **looped** to assist those who have difficulty hearing. If you have a T-coil in your hearing aid, you may sit anywhere in this section and hear via the amplification system. **Hearing assist devices** are also available from the ushers. These are operational anywhere in the Church. The ushers will ask for your car keys as a reminder to return the device. **Large print copies** of the Book of Common Prayer are available from the ushers for your use during the service.

The Saint Philip's Friends of Music presents the second of three concerts of their popular series, Summer Sizzlers - Cool Hot Jazz for the Summer! On Sunday, July 29th, 2018 at 2:00pm in the church, come see Tucson's own Grupo Riken! Grupo Riken has been delighting audiences in the Tucson area since 2009, including at the Puerto Rico Benefit Concert held at Saint Philip's last October. ### *University of Arizona Summer Lecture Series*

The Thirty Years' War (1618-1648) was a period of unparalleled destruction in central Europe, razing towns and villages to the ground and claiming millions of lives through combat, famine, and disease. In 2018 the UA Division for Late Medieval and Reformation Studies is marking the 400th anniversary of the beginning of the Thirty Years' War with a series of events on "The Miseries of War."

This year's Summer Lecture Series will extend its scope beyond the political strategies, military tactics, and battle fronts. The lectures will seek to examine the daily hardships, suffering, and devastation inflicted on civilian populations in towns and villages. They will focus on various aspects of the experience of religious wars: that of civilians compelled to quarter invading troops, the role of women in early modern armies, clergy advising on war and military activities, and the emotional effects on individuals and communities. The lectures will be held at 10:15am in the Music Center.

Ute Lotz-Heumann, Director of the Division and Heiko A. Oberman Professor of Late Medieval and Reformation History, and Beth Plummer, Susan C. Karant-Nunn Professor of Reformation and Early Modern European History, will contextualize and comment on each of the following lectures:

Our Sister's Keeper dives into issues of poverty, dignity and gender justice. These conversations will help us to delve more deeply into this as well. Mosaic Dinners August 15th, 22nd, and 29th will focus on the issues that Our Sister's Keeper

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art show brings to the fore. Following Evening Prayer in the side chapel (5:30pm-6:00pm), and getting dinner served up (6:00pm-6:30pm), there will be presentations and discussions from 6:30pm-7:45pm each of those evenings in the Gallery.

On August 15th, a group of female artists from Saint Philip's will share with us about their artistic journeys and how their life as women and people of faith mutually inform that journey. On August 22nd, Liane Hernandez, Community Outreach and Education Director, from the Tucson YWCA will present about the projects that she and her organization are working on that lift up the voices of underrepresented groups and equip women for leadership. On August 29th, a representative from Emerge! Center Against Domestic Abuse will make a presentation on domestic abuse and the local resources.

We affirm the God-given dignity of every person and pray that in our community we can have honest and hopeful conversations about issues affecting women, and look for ways God calls us to participate in the support of all God's people.

## *From the Parish Nurse*

You may or may not know about Sepsis, but I believe it's an important condition for you to understand. In most people with sepsis, characterized by insufficient blood flow, a source of infection can be identified. Respiratory tract (pneumonia), stomach, kidney (urinary tract infection), and skin are the most frequent sources of developing sepsis. An obvious source may not be found as it may be due to an immune system that isn't working properly or an abnormally low level of white blood cells may exist.

People most at risk for developing sepsis are: over age 65, have chronic medical conditions (diabetes, lung disease, cancer, and kidney disease), weakened immune systems and children under 1 year of age.

Some people who have sepsis develop a reddish rash or small red dots on their skin throughout the body. Sepsis may also cause pain in the joints of the wrists, elbows, back, hips, knees, and ankles. Decreased urinary output may exist due to inadequate blood flow.

You may be wondering: why is this an issue now? It recently impacted a member in our Saint Philip's community, and as a volunteer chaplain at Northwest Medical Center I have seen an increase in the number of patients with sepsis. Medically, sepsis is defined as a life-threatening organ dysfunction due to an impaired immune response to infection.

Seek immediate medical attention if you have several of these symptoms simultaneously: suspected or confirmed infection, a fever (over 101 F or below 96.8), chills, severe shaking, fast pulse (over 90 beats per minute), and rapid breathing (over 20 breaths per minute). An abnormally low blood pressure may cause: lightheadedness or confusion, dizziness and weakness, shortness of breath, or chest pain. The symptoms will reflect which organ in the body is lacking adequate blood flow.
